Dear Members,

This past month saw a slow down from our busy Anzac month.

At our last members meeting concerns were raised by Brian P about aspects of our dawn service and Anzac march/memorial. They were all valid points which need to be addressed next time.

We are all guilty, self included, of expecting others to think of all aspects associated with the Anzac Memorial Day and the weeks leading up to it. Our Sub-Branch committee needs to have more emphasis on delegating responsibilities to members with feedback to the Committee, once organised and completed.

John Gordon Secretary is a tireless worker who never says no to anything. We need to load-shed some of his workload and not just expect him to take-up the slack.

This will be an agenda item for our next Committee meeting to debate.

This is what happens when you speak your truth:

- 1. You start valuing yourself more once you realize that your opinion counts. Your opinion matters because it's what you think and what you believe about a particular issue; it's your take on a given situation. Remember, an opinion is not absolute, irrefutable truth; it's your truth. Once you realize that speaking up and stating what you believe is a form of valuing yourself, you will be inclined to do this more often.
- **2. You liberate yourself from half-truths and webs of lies**. You don't feel obliged to pay insincere compliments or agree with someone so that you please them. Once you start censoring yourself, wondering if you 'd better not say this and avoid mentioning that, you fall into the trap of half-truths. You see it, you want to comment on it, you have an opinion- yet you keep your mouth shut. You probably find some excuses that you tell yourself about your choice not to speak up; after that, it's only a matter of time to find yourself tangled in a web of lies, those you tell yourself and those you tell others.
- 3. You don't allow worries to hold you back. Speaking your truth paves the way to paths that you couldn't see before. When you state what you believe, when you share your opinion, then you allow multiple possibilities to unfold. You stop worrying about what you should or should not say or whether to say something or not. Eliminating worries such as these sets you free. Now you have the freedom to choose not

only what to say but to act and pursue what you believe is right and worthwhile. By speaking your truth, a shift happens; your mind focuses on solutions and possibilities instead of worrying.

- 4. You become assertive. Realizing that you are no longer controlled by your worries, speaking your truth becomes an excellent small habit. It becomes your way of relating to the world and setting healthy boundaries. For example, when for example you say "no" when you don't want something, when you disagree with someone or when you put a stop to an offensive behavior, these are all effective boundary-setting ways.
- 5. **Being authentic**. You can speak your truth in a gentle, heartfelt, respectful way. Maybe what you say is not pleasing to the other person, but the way you say it is polite and sincere. And people appreciate honesty, partly because they realize that deep down, it provides useful feedback. When you get in the habit of speaking your truth in your unique way, you will find that you are becoming more aligned with your values and true beliefs. This way, you feel and come across as more authentic.

General Business

ANZAC Day

It was a pity that the young man from one of the schools collapsed, first responders said he fainted. We need to respond to the Fire Brigade as their Paramedics quickly assisted (The RFS were our First Aid responders). Brian Partridge suggested that the schools be approached regarding organising ANZAC Day events, we need to get them involved – Secretary mentioned that this issue has been suggested to Alstonville High School especially as an Event Management exercise, and if it would fit into the curriculum, we are waiting for a response.

Brian then spoke about some issues that had arisen on ANZAC Day – The conduct of the Dawn Service was embarrassing – the service did not follow the program, it was very short, the wreath laying appeared rushed and the invitation for the public to lay wreaths was almost an afterthought. We need to invite the crowd closer at the Dawn Service as well. Finally, the Dawn Service was nearly late in starting. The secretary apologised to the meeting, and stated that he had already noted those issues (and several others) and has resolved to improve for the next Commemorative event, he accepted the points raised in the manner they were raised, as helpful criticism. Some discussion ensued.

Noel Toneguzzi raised the issue about the noise from the garbage truck, requested it be raised with Council (advised that this has arisen before, and it's the Garbage Collecting Company that has to be contacted, not Council). Meeting resolved to deal with the matter.

• Air Conditioning.

Air Conditioning of the hall –Gary Henderson-Smith (Hyphen) has received one quote so far and is waiting for another. Both are local and will probably be about the same (less than \$4500 installed) once we have the quotes, it will be put to the meeting.

Secretary advised that we have been contacted about a FREE upgrade to a Heat Pump Hot Water System at no cost to the sub-Branch. We are waiting for more details.

Secretary then suggested that we should look at upgrading the Solar Panels, replacing the existing with a 10kWh system, which would then provide the power to run the Air Conditioner and still export to the grid. A Battery is still not 'cost effective' yet! Please discuss.

As an addition, many local financial institutions and businesses provide Community type grants that may be applicable.

President then addressed the meeting about Mental Health. We all have good days and bad days, and we need to take the time to identify when someone is having a bad day, all it takes is a quiet RUOK, or a word of support. The sub-Branch is a safe haven, we are all tarred with the black dog to some degree or another, and just simply asking can make a big difference to someone.

The Secretary moved that an amount of \$70 be approved to cover the cost of a new Zeller EFTPOS machine (Special deal, \$65 plus \$5 Aldi SIM card) Seconded Bob Wilson – CARRIED.

ANZAC Day Primary School writing competition, members were asked if they would like to make a special prize available for the overall winning entry, the Book Vouchers are given to the two best from each school. Further discussion is needed.

Kayleen raised the issue that the Plaza Butchers had happily allowed her to place an ANZAC Day poster in their window (after the Coles Manager had agreed, but then forgot to tell his staff, he was away!).

Grahame Gooding mentioned that Legacy had a very successful Garage Sale last Saturday and a donation of \$200 was made to the sub-Branch for allowing the use of the hall.

Meeting closed at 11.25.



DVA Gold Card – Many Vietnam and other Returned from Active Service Veterans are not aware of their entitlement to a DVA Gold Card which is not means or asset tested.

To check for your entitlement complete the DVA form D3057 "Application for a Gold Card for Veterans of Australia's Defence Force". Those under 70 and not in receipt of any DVA payment can complete DVA form D0506 "Claim to determine Qualifying service by current or ex-member of the ADF".
